


The Benefice of Harden, Wilsden, Cullingworth, Denholme Sunday 22 June 2025 First Sunday After Trinity

Call to worship

First reading: Galatians 3:23-end

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

Second reading: Luke 8: 26-39

Then they arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me'— for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, 'What is your name?' He said, 'Legion'; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned. When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed

by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, 'Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you.' So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

Reflection with Astrid

In my New English Bible it is headed 'Jesus cures a madman', but I am sure I am not the only one who thinks of it as 'the one about the pigs rushing over the cliff'.

Here is a story full of disturbing elements — a man suffering dreadfully from a graphically described mental condition, brutal treatment by his neighbours, whether for his or their own safety, the fate of all those pigs, the likely bad outcome for the men charged with looking after them. Even when we get to what should be the happy ending, we find the whole population so fearful they just want the healer to go away.

It is an incident recorded in very similar words in three of the Gospels. Now what can it be saying to us? There is an old French saying: 'Autre temps, autre moeurs' – generally interpreted as 'other times, other customs' or as the writer L P Hartley put it, 'The past is a foreign country. They do things differently there.'

Of course the words and actions of Jesus are for all people and all ages, but his life on Earth took place over a short and very real period of time and in a real place, and those who saw and heard him were real people of that particular time and culture. The witnesses to this healing heard Jesus use words they understood; they saw a naked man, disturbed and probably dangerous; they saw a breed of animals which they would have no dealings with, fall over a cliff; they saw foreigners they had nothing to do with run away in fear; they saw a man clothed and sitting peacefully and heard their leader's instruction to him.

Perhaps if something like this happened today, we would report what we saw with different words and different explanations, although I am not sure we have

moved on as far as we like to think in our response to deeply disturbed people whose behaviour we don't understand, concern for frightened foreigners, or our attitude to animals. But whatever words those first witnesses used and passed on to the Gospel writers, the messages are clear.

First and foremost, it is yet another demonstration of the ultimate power of Jesus, Son of God, over the forces of evil in whatever form they take. Secondly, this loving and merciful act took place in a foreign country on the eastern side of the lake and for the healing of a man of that country. This is just one of the events in the Gospels making it clear that the Good News knows no national or racial boundaries. This is reinforced when the healed man is told to, "Go back home and tell *them* everything that God has done for you."

In today's world with its constant news of disasters, crime, wars and inhumanity, let us find comfort and strength in the assurance of victory of the power of God over evil, whatever its origin, and let us not forget the instruction to go and tell, no matter how inadequate a messenger we may feel.
