


The Benefice of Harden, Wilsden, Cullingworth, Denholme Sunday 18 May 2025 The Fifth Sunday of Easter

The Readings

First reading: Acts 11: 1-18

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So, when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, 'Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?' Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, 'I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely, I saw fourfooted animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, "Get up, Peter; kill and eat." But I replied, "By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth." But a second time the voice answered from heaven, "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, "Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved." And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, "John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?' When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, 'Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life.'

Thanks be to God for the gift of his word.

Second reading: John 13:31-35

When he had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Reflection with Robert

If I had received a pound for every time I have heard the words "love one another as I have loved you", I would be a wealthy man. If I had received a pound for every time I heard the words "love one another as I have loved you" and acted in the way that Jesus has loved me, I would be a poor man.

I find it easy to understand that we should love one another, and I hope I can demonstrate that that is what I try to achieve in my daily life. This love is not a new idea, as love of neighbour is throughout the whole of the bible and in the commandments. But to love one another as Jesus has loved has made me think about these words and has given me a challenge. How can I even start to love as Jesus has loved me?

In today's culture, the word 'love' means many things. You can love your husband or wife, your country, your cat, your mobile phone or your car, but hopefully you don't love your husband or wife the same way you love your mobile phone or car. Agape (God's love) is an unconditional commitment to love and doesn't change whether the love is returned or not. Your heart decides to seek the other person's highest good, no matter how they may respond. But it is the way that Jesus loves that is new: through service. Love is selfless and unconditional, and directs kindness, respect, and loyalty towards the loved one. 'God is love, and all who live in love live in God, and God lives in them. And as we live in God, our love grows more perfect. What makes us stand out isn't our words but our love for one another. When we can overcome our

differences, when we can accept denomination, race, and culture and truly love one another, the world is drawn to Christ.

Unloved people are often unloving people, so it's important that we feel loved by God. When we don't feel genuinely loved, we don't feel like giving love. So, first, we have to experience God's love for ourselves. During our worst acts and in our lowest moments, Jesus loves us.

Knowing we're loved by Jesus gives us value and security; it also enables us to risk loving others. All God asks is that we're willing to love, and He'll supply the power to do it. 'The love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us'

So, to answer my question, "how can I even start to love as Jesus has loved me"? One of our confessional prayers on Sunday gave me a clue: "We have lived by the light of our own eyes, as faithless and not believing", but what Jesus asks us to do, He empowers us to do: 'The love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us. So hopefully I can start earning those pounds again.

Affirmation of Faith
